
There are 9 innings in a baseball game, in which the visiting team bats in the top half, and home team bats in the bottom.
 A team hits in an inning until the defense gets three outs.
 The object of the game is to have the most runs after nine innings.


The Basics - When one team is up to bat, the other team is playing defense in the field. There are nine positions on the field– pitcher, catcher, first base, second base, third base, shortstop, left field, center field, and right field. The pitcher can either throw a strike or a ball – strikes are pitches that go through the strike zone, over home plate and between the batters knees and chest. Balls are pitches thrown outside the strike zone. Strikes are acquired when the batter swings and misses the ball, when an umpire calls the pitch a strike (without a swing), or hits it into foul territory (before strike 2).


Three strikes equal a strike out. Four balls are considered a walk, and the batter goes to first base. Outs are also obtained when a player on the field catches a ball before the ball touches the ground, the batter or base-runner is tagged by someone with the ball (while not on the base), or when a throw beats the runner to a base (on force plays).

Getting a Hit - A single is when a batter reaches first base safely after hitting the ball. A double refers to when a batter reaches second base and a triple when he reaches third. A home run is when the batter hits the ball over the outfield fence in fair territory (without bounc-ing).

Pitchers can be taken out at any time of the game and be replaced by relief pitchers. Teams have a 5-man starting rotation of pitchers that pitch once every five games, The staff of relief pitchers is called the Bullpen. A closer is a skilled relief pitcher, who pitches at the end of every close game (generally in the 9th inning). His job is to close out the game, hence the name.







Playing the Game

The Object: The team with the most runs after 9 innings wins the game.

The Basics: A run is when a player advances around the diamond touching all 4 bases, scoring 1 point.

An inning is a round of play where two teams alternate as offence and defence, called the top half and the bottom half, where the offence tries to score runs and the defence tries to get 3 players on the other team out.

Outs are obtained by catching a hit ball before it touches the ground, by tagging an offensive player with the ball while they're not touching a base, or by throwing 3 strikes (pitching balls past the batter through the strike zone, an imaginary box over home plate between the batter's knees and chest).

Defensive players have 9 positions: pitcher, catcher, first base, second base, third base, and shortstop in the infield, and left field, centre field, and right field in the outfield.

Offensive players, the batters and base-runners, try to advance to the next base after the ball is hit by the batter in fair territory (between the first and third base lines which extend from the infield to the outfield). If a batter touches one base after hitting the ball before going out this is called a single, 2 bases is called a double, and 3 bases a triple. If the batter hits the ball over the outfield fence in fair territory all offensive players on the diamond are allowed to advance to the home plate: this is a home run.

A batter is also allowed to walk to the first base if the pitcher throws 4 balls past the batter outside the strike zone.








BASEBALL General Facts



- Each team plays 162 regular season games between April and September.
- Games are predominantly played against teams within the same league with a majority of games played against teams within the same division. Each team plays a few weeks of inter-league games, where teams from the National League play the American League and vice versa.
- If a game is tied after nine innings, the teams play extra innings. The extra innings continue until one team has the lead at the end of the inning. If the visiting team scores in the top of an inning, the home team still has the opportunity to bat in the bottom of the inning to tie or win the game.
- If the ball hits the ground in fair territory then bounces over the fence, it is a ground-rule double and the batter automatically goes to second base and any base-runners advance only two bases.
- If the pitcher throws a pitch that hits the batter (without him swinging), the batter goes to first base (known as a walk).
- Any batting average above .300 (getting a hit 3 times out of every 10 at bats) is generally considered a good batting average.
- Once a player is substituted, he cannot return to the game.
- The American League features a player called the Designated Hitter, or the DH, who bats in place of the pitcher. In the National League, all pitchers must bat. During inter-league play or the World Series, the DH is used only when the home team is from the American League.








- The first World Series was held in 1903 and has been held every year except for 1904 when the National League refused to play the allegedly inferior American League and in 1994; the players went on strike in August and team owners cancelled the World Series.
- The post season series between the AL and NL champs was originally known as the "Championship of the World" or "World's Championship Series" that was shortened through usage to "World's Series" and finally to "World Series."
- The Boston Red Sox (Fenway Park) and the Chicago Cubs (Wigley Field) have the oldest stadiums in Major League Baseball.
- The Little League World Series is an international baseball tournament held for players between the ages of 11 and 13. The tournament is
 held annually in August in South Williamsport and began in 1947. ESPN broadcasted its first LLWS event in 2007, and it has now become
 the world's largest organised youth sports program. The program currently involves nearly 180,000 teams across the world, and more
 than 35 million people are believed to have played or volunteered for a Little League program.



The Object: The team with the most goals after 3 twenty minute periods wins the game.

The Basics: A goal is scored when a player shoots the puck past the opposing team's goal line and into the net, giving the team 1 point.


Teams have typically 6 players on the ice, 3 offensive forwards (left wing, centre, and right wing) that try to score goals, and 2 defensemen (right and left) and a goaltender that try to prevent the other team from scoring. Players must direct and control the puck using the blade at the end of the hockey stick.

One of the key defensive tactics in ice hockey is bodychecking, where a player tries to steal the puck from another, or simply slow down an opponent, by shoving them with their shoulder or hip.


Players can be taken off the ice if they commit a penalty, and they must sit in the penalty box for 2 to 10 minutes (depending on the severity of the foul). This is a power-play for the other team, since they have an advantage with extra skaters on the ice during the penalty.

Each team's defensive zone is marked with a blue line. A player cannot enter the other team's zone before the puck, as this is considered being offside.

Each play begins with a face-off, when the referee drops the puck between two opposing players, and the clock is started. The clock and game play is stopped after a goal, the puck goes over the glass, the goalie catches or covers the puck, an official blows his whistle calls a penalty or offside, or the clock reads 20 minutes at the end of a period.


ICE HOCKEY General Facts



- In the regular season, each team plays 82 games which includes 41 at home and 41 away.
- If a player commits a penalty on another player from behind while that player is in the motion of shooting, the shooter is awarded a penalty shot. The shooter goes one-on-one with the goalie and tries to score.
- The most common penalties are boarding, charging, delay of game, cross-checking, elbowing, high-sticking, holding, hooking, interference, roughing, slashing, tripping, and fighting.
- The AHL is the minor league to the NHL. Many AHL organisations act as "feeder" programmes for the NHL. The AHL has the exact same layout as the NHL in terms of conferences and divisions. The only difference is the teams.
- In the AHL post season, the best eight teams from each conference make the playoffs. The conference quarterfinals are played as a "best of five" series. The rest of the playoff system is the same format as the NHL. The winner of each conference meets in the Calder Cup for the Championship.
- In the 2011 season, 82% of NHL players were graduates of the AHL. The Hershey Bears won the most Calder Cup championships, with 11 NHL hall of fame inductee Patrick Roy won the Calder Cup in his first and only season in the AHL. He went on to win two Stanley Cups.
- The Calder Cup is named after the first president of the NHL, Frank Calder. 26 members of the NHL Hall of Fame have won the Calder Cup.
- The AHL Springfield Indians are the only team to win the Calder cup three seasons in a row in the 73 year history.







- The first Stanley Cup was awarded in 1893 in Canada, making it the oldest trophy competed for by professional athletes. It weighs about 35 pounds.
- The red line on the ice is dashed because in the days of black and white television it was difficult to differentiate between the red and blue lines.
- Clint Benedict was the first goalie to ever wear a mask, after a shot by Howie Mornez knocked him unconscious back in 1927. Goalie masks were not worn full-time until 1959.
- In the Joe Louis Arena, home of the Detroit Red Wings, an octopus is thrown onto the ice whenever the Red Wings host a playoff game. The tradition started during the 1952 playoffs because the octopus, which had eight arms, symbolized the number of playoff wins the Red Wings needed to win the Stanley Cup. The tradition has continued during every home playoff game ever since.
- The NHL record for fastest shot is held by Boston Bruins Defenseman Zdeno Chara at 108.8 miles per hour. Every player and coach who wins the Stanley Cup gets his name engraved on the trophy.

The Object: The team with the most baskets after 4 twelve minute periods wins the game.

The Basics: A basket is scored when a player shoots the ball and it passes downward through the opposing team's basket (a net suspended from a hoop 10 feet off the ground). Successful free throws (from the free-throw line) awarded after an opponent's foul are worth 1 point, shots within an opponent's the three-point line are worth 2 points, and shots from further than the three-point line are worth 3 points.

Teams have 5 players on the court at a time, a centre, 2 forwards, and 2 guards. Players must move the ball down the court by dribbling (bouncing it with one hand) or passing it to a teammate. More than 2 steps without dribbling is considered a travel, and the use of two hands a double-dribble. These violations result in the other team getting possesion of the ball.

Each play is fast-paced and carefully timed. Players have 8 seconds to get the ball from the baseline to half-court, 24 seconds to shoot the ball after getting possession, and are allowed only 3 seconds at a time inside an opponent's key near the basket.

Common styles of shooting the ball are the jump-shot (ball is released during a jump), the layup (ball is laid into the basket while leaping), and the slam dunk (throwing the ball down through the basket while airborne).

Common defence tactics are man-to-man defence (blocking another player without touching them, trying to grab the ball during an opponent's shot), and rebounding (obtaining possession of the ball after a missed shot to the basket).












BASKETBALL General Facts




- Teams play 82 games during the regular season 41 at home and 41 away.
- A technical foul is given when a player or coach shows poor sportsmanship. The opposing team then chooses one of its players to shoot
 free throws. If a coach or player receives two technicals in a single game, he is ejected and must go to the locker room for the remainder
 of the game.
- A flagrant-one foul is given for a reckless foul, and the fouled player gets a technical free throw in addition to the ball. A flagrant-two foul
 is a reckless foul with intent to injure, and it results in an ejection of the player who committed the foul. In both situations, the victim's team
 is awarded two free throws and possession of the ball.
- The WNBA is the only women's major league sport in North America. The league was created in 1996 on April 24th after finding inspiration from the NBA. The WNBA is composed of twelve teams in two conferences. The Eastern Conference and the Western Conference.
- Just like the NBA, the WNBA gives awards for their top performing players every year. These awards include the most valuable player, the all WNBA team, the defensive player of the year, the all WNBA defensive team, the rookie of the year, the all WNBA rookie team, the most improved player, the sixth woman of the year, the coach of the year, the sportsmanship award and the WNBA peak performers award which include peak performance scoring, rebounding and assists.
- The WNBA shares the same arena as many of their NBA counterparts. In fact, only four WNBA teams have their own market and are not neighboured by an NBA team.







- On August 3rd, 1949, the BAA agreed to merge with the National Basketball League, creating the National Basketball Association.
- The first hoops were just peach baskets and the first backboards were made of wire created by former Kansas Coach and Professor James Naismith.
- The shortest player in the NBA today is point guard, Earl Boykins, standing at just 5 feet 5 inches (1.65 M). The tallest current player in the NBA is Centre, Hasheem Thabeet reaching a massive 7'3".
- In 1979 the NBA added the then-defunct American Basketball Association's three-point shot.
- The Boston Celtics have won the most NBA championships (17), including seven straight from 1960 to 1966.
- In 1962, Kansas legend Wilt Chamberlain set the record for most points scored in one season with 4,029. During that season, Chamberlain
 also scored 100 points in one game against the New York Knicks, giving him the record for most points in one game.
- Michael Jordan, regarded as the best player in NBA history, wore a different pair of Nike Air Jordan shoes every year he played in the NBA.



AMERICAN FOOTBALL

Playing the Game



The Object: The team with the most points through touchdowns and field goals after 4 fifteen minute quarters wins the game.

The Basics: A touchdown, worth 6 points, is when the ball is advanced into the opponent's end zone by catching or running with the ball. A field goal is when the ball is kicked successfully between an opponent's upright goal posts, and is worth 3 points. After a touchdown the scoring team has 2 options: attempt a field goal for an extra point, or try another touchdown from the 2 yard line for 2 extra points (called a two-point conversion).

After scoring, and at the start of each half of the game, there is a kickoff (where the ball is kicked from one team to another off of a tee on the 35 yard line).

Teams have 11 players on the field. The team playing offence is led by the quarterback who calls plays and throws passes, the long passes generally going to the 2 wide receivers and short passes to 2 running backs. The 6 players protecting and in front of the quarterback are the offensive line. The other team has a defensive line, linebackers, and defensive backs, whose tactics are to occupy the offensive line, rush the quarterback, and tackle (force a player to the ground) or intercept the ball intended for the receivers.

The team with possession of the ball has 4 downs (or chances) to advance the ball 10 yards from the line of scrimmage (a temporary starting point on the field where they last got possession of the ball). If they gain 10 yards they keep possession and get a new set of downs (starting from the first down) and can continue advancing towards the opponent's end zone. If 10 yards is not made on the third down the team can elect to punt, or kick, the ball on the forth down, even trying for field goal if the goal posts are in the kicker's range. Possession changes to the opponent's team after 4 downs.





General Facts



- If a game is tied after regulation (60 miutes), the teams play a 15-minute overtime quarter in which each team has an opportunity to have possession of the ball, unless the team that receives the ball first scores a touchdown on its opening drive. If the team does not score a touchdown, the game continues until one team takes a lead. If no team scores in the 15 minutes, the game ends in a tie.
- Each team plays every team in their division twice (home and away) in addition to a host of other teams based from different divisions. As an NFL team, you will never play all other teams in a single season.
- American Football is a game of strategy. Because the play stops after every down, players and coaches are able to converse and choose
 a play based on a playbook with 50-100 plays.
- In addition to the offensive and defensive lines, there is a group of players on a football team called special teams. This group is used during kickoffs, punts, field goals and extra point attempts.
- A penalty against one team is signalled by the referee throwing a yellow flag onto the field. Most common penalties: delay of game, face mask, false start, holding, illegal contact, intentional grounding, offside, pass interference, personal foul.
- The CFL is Canada's version of the NFL, it is the highest level of professional football in Canada. The league has only eight teams with two
 divisions (East and the West) and four teams located in each division. The CFL has a 19 week regular season that includes one bye week
 for each team before the post season race where teams battle it out to claim the ultimate CFL prize, the Grey Cup.










- Teams only play one game a week because the strategy preparation (watching films, learning plays, etc.) is so extensive.
- American football is derived from rugby in England. There may have been a forerunner to American football called Harpaston, played by the ancient Greeks.
- The first league of professional teams was called the American Professional Football Association, formed in 1920. The admission fee was \$100 per team.
- With almost \$9 billion in revenues, the NFL is the world's richest sports league.
- The first AFL-NFL World Championship game featured the Kansas City Chiefs for the AFL and the Green Bay Packers for the NFL. The Packers won and that game was later named Super Bowl I.
- The Minnesota Vikings got its name because Minnesota is the centre of Swedish culture in the United States.
- The Baltimore Colts (Now in Indianapolis) were the first NFL team to have cheerleaders.
- The New York Giants and Indianapolis Colts quarterbacks Eli and Peyton Manning are the only set of brothers to both play quarterback in a Super Bowl.
- It is estimated that over 1 billion chicken wings are consumed on Super Bowl Sunday.

- Unlike most sports, there are no playoffs for Division I college football. Instead, there are 35 Bowl Games.
- The teams are selected to play in a bowl game based on how they performed during the regular season. Teams can be invited to play in a bowl game by winning at least six games and by not having a losing record.
- The most important games form the Bowl Championship Series (BCS), they are: the BCS National Championship Game, the Rose Bowl, the Fiesta Bowl, the Sugar Bowl and the Orange Bowl.
- The BCS National Championship Game is a separate game from the BCS Bowl games and rotates amongst these four bowl sites. It features
 the two teams that finished the regular season ranked No. 1 and No. 2 in the BCS rankings, which are a combination of all the rankings.
- College football is much older than the NFL. The first intercollegiate game was played on November 6, 1869 between Rutgers University and Princeton University.
- 21 schools play in stadiums with capacities over 80,000. The largest stadium is University of Michigan's, Michigan Stadium (110,000) followed by Penn State's, Beaver Stadium (108,000).
 The instalment of the NFL draft, which was made up of mostly college players, in 1936 drew more fans to watch the NFL, helping its growth into a major sport.
- The Heisman Trophy is awarded to the top College Football player at the end of every season. Archie Griffin is the only player to ever win
 the prized trophy twice. Baylor's Robert Griffin III won the award in 2011.

- Unlike college football and college basketball, college baseball in the United States has little impact in determining what athletes go on to play in the major or minor leagues. Players are not required to go to college in order to play professionally. As a result; proportionately, a lot less college players go on to play in the MLB as compared to the NBA and NFL. There are over 280 NCAA Division I teams alone throughout the US and all of these teams are obliged to run by the same rules, obstacles and restrictions throughout the year.
- The final rounds of the NCAA tournaments are known as the College World Series; they are held in each of the three Divisions, 1, 2 and 3. They are all sanctioned by the NCAA. The playoff bracket for Division I consists of 64 teams, with 4 teams playing at each of 16 regional sites. These tournaments are run as a double-elimination series. The 16 winners advance to the Super Regionals at 8 different sites. The competing teams then play head-to-head in a "best of three series." The 8 winners then advance to the College World Series, a double elimination tournament with two separate 4 team brackets to determine the two national finalists. The finalists play a "best of three series" to determine the Division I National Champion.
- California was the first College World Series Champion. They won the title in 1947. There neighbours, Southern California won the second in 1948.
- Southern California and Florida State University are the only two universities to win the College World Series five times in a row.
- Texas University was the first University to win a back-to-back College National Championship. They won in 1949 and 1950.

- In NCAA Ice Hockey, like most other NCAA sports, teams play a series of games in the aim of qualifying for the postseason tournament. At the end of the regular season, 16 teams are ranked by their regular season record by an NCAA Selection Committee. The champion from each conference gets an automatic bid into the NCAA Tournament.
- The tournament begins at four regional locations. Each regional champion will continue on to the Frozen Four, held at one single location.
 The Frozen Four consists of the semi-final games and the championship game. The tournament is single elimination.
- The NCAA Tournament used to only invite 12 teams, but that number was upped to 16 in 2003.
- One of the most recognisable coaches in Ice Hockey history is Herb Brooks. He was known for coaching the 1980 USA Gold-medal Olympic hockey team, but he also coached at the University of Minnesota.
- The three teams to win back-to-back national championships are the University of Denver, Boston University and the University of Michigan.
- The longest NCAA ice hockey game ever was played on March 12, 2010 between Quinnipiac University and Union College. The teams
 played into five overtimes, 150 minutes, before Quinnipiac scored the game winner.



- Founded by Bill France Sr. in 1947-8, NASCAR has become North America's most famous and popular motorsport. NASCAR is known as one of North America's elite sports. In terms of US television ratings, it surpasses the NBA, NHL, MLB and MLS. It is second only to the NFL.
- The Sprint Cup Series is the highest level of professional competition, consisting of 36 races over a ten month period.
- The Chase for the Sprint Cup, a championship points system, begins when there are only ten races left in the Sprint Cup Series. Only the
 top twelve drivers are eligible for the championship. Each driver in the top twelve has his points reset to 5,000 and also receives a ten-point
 bonus for every race won out of the first 26. Wins from this point in the season onward are worth five more points than usual.
- Races include: Daytona 500 at Daytona International Speedway, Aaron's 499 at Talladega Super Speedway, Coca-Cola 600 at Lowe's Motor Speedway, Brickyard 400 at Indianapolis Motor Speedway, Ford 400 at Homestead-Miami Speedway.
- Points System: The point system for NASCAR races include 1st place being awarded with 43 points and 15th place being awarded with 29 points. The points decrease by one by each place after 1st. 1 bonus point is awarded to any driver that leads any lap. Another bonus point is awarded to the driver who leads the most laps. 3 bonus points are awarded to the driver that wins the race. 48 points is the most any driver can get in an individual race.



- The 22 race NHRA Full Throttle drag Racing Series has two sections. A 16 race regular season and a six race playoff which is the countdown to the championship. After the 16 race regular season the ten racers with the most points in each division advance to the playoffs. Everyone's points are reset and the overall leader begins with a 30 point advantage. The top ten racers then race for the world championship.
- Cars drag race down a straight track with a length of 402 meters.
- Cars wait for a large stop light to turn green, which is when the race begins. The car to cross the finish line first wins the race.
- Top Divisions of the NHRA: Top Fuel Dragster (Cars run on 90% nitro methane and 10% methanol), Funny Car (Cars have forward mounted engines and vaguely resembles manufactured showroom model cars), Pro Stock (Factory hot rods with no artificial induction such as nitrous oxide), Pro Stock Motorcycle (Two wheeled version of pro stock cars).
- Famous Tracks: Lucas Oil Raceway at Indianapolis, Gainesville Raceway in Florida, Auto Club Raceway at Pomona.
- Interesting Fact: NHRA Top Fuel dragsters can exceed 280 mph in just 660 feet.

Interesting Facts:

- Rolex took over as the sponsor in 2002.
- The cars used are known as Daytona Prototypes.
- The sports premiere event is the Rolex 24 at Daytona, where a 24-hour endurance race takes place.
- Because of the low cost of cars, there are often high car counts in the series' races. In fact, there are sometimes so many cars that races classified as "GT events" race on Saturday, while "DP races" run on Sunday.

- The Global RallyCross Championship combines the best aspects of circuit racing, off-road racing and rally competition to deliver intense action in a variety of fan-friendly environments. Action sport stars including Travis Pastrana and Brian Deegan have described the sport as "motocross with a roll cage."
- This made-in-the USA variation on the established European sport of Rallycross pits small production-based cars against each other for door-to-door racing featuring dirt, asphalt, and a 70 foot gap jump. Drivers progress through a series of timed heats to a final race, where winner takes all. Multiple cars line up to start at once and jostle for the win over a four-lap race. (The final, or A Main race, is a 5 lap race).
- In the heat races, drivers run three laps of one course configuration and must take a longer diversion known as the joker lap once, at their option. Global RallyCross Championship events are the only races in the world featuring an incredible 70 foot gap jump on the joker lap, adding a component of excitement and risk to a key strategic racing element. The strategy for the joker lap is a critical element to the sport: a little bit like a NASCAR pit stop, every competitor has to take it the question is when?

Interesting Facts

- Drivers progress through short mini-races called heats, where the slowest drivers become eliminated from the competition. The final drivers remaining race against each other.
- The first ever Rallycross event was held in 1967, and has featured in the X Games since 2010. There are 6 races held per year.

- It was created in the spirit of the 24 Hours of Le Mans, a 24 hour race held near Le Mans, France. It is the world's oldest active sports car race in endurance racing.
 Race lengths vary from 1 hour and 40 minutes to 12 hours.
- There are three primary classes of cars that race, all at the same time.

Racing Leagues

- Each car is driven by multiple drivers, due to the length of the races.
- The team points champions and runners-up in each class at the end of the season receive an automatic invitation to the next year's 24 Hours of Le Mans.
- There are 10 races in a season, with the Petit Le Mans as the finale. The Petite Le Mans is a 10 hour race, and is the American Le Mans Series' most famous race.



The Object: The team with the most goals after 4 fifteen minute quarters wins the game.

The Basics: A goal is scored when a player shoots the ball into the opposing team's goal, scoring 1 point if in front the two-point line and 2 points if shot from behind the two-point goal line.

A face-off starts the play at the beginning of each quarter and after each goal. During a face-off 2 players lay their sticks on the field inches from to the ball, the official blows the whistle, and the midfielders lift their sticks and scrap for possession.

Teams have 10 players on the field, a goalkeeper, 3 defenders, 3 midfielders, and 3 attackers. The midfielders are the only players allowed to roam the entire field. Players must advance the ball along the field using the head of the lacrosse stick, using it to catch, carry, or pass the ball.

The key defensive tactics are to use stick checking and body contact to dispossess opponents of the ball.

A clock is used to keep up the game's pace. Teams have 20 seconds to clear the midfield line, and 60 seconds to score before they loose possession.
